She is recalling actual events that she personally experienced. Michaela's Uncle Abdullah treated her badly because she looked different. He fed her less and wouldn't let her go to school. He was concerned that he would not get a fair 'bride price' because of her skin condition. She remembers being treated differently to other children because she was seen as 'ugly' or 'damaged' because of her skin condition. Vitiligo causes the skin to have large white patches all over the body. Michaela chose to share this part of her life because she wants people to understand what it was like for her growing up with vitiligo. | |
